B604: contains a unit on Peace and Justice and one on Religion and the Media. 2 Philosophy units with two units studied in each. B601: contains a unit on Belief in Deity and one on the End of life. B602: contains a unit on Good and Evil and one final unit on Religion and Science.		
Units and weighting:	Each unit forms 25% of the full GCSE. There are no controlled assessments; all four units are examined.
