



Due to the unusual temperatures for this time of year, we have decided to bring forward the date that pupils are permitted to come to school in summer uniform.

Pupils do not have to wear, or bring to school, their blazer or jumper. However, outdoor coats, sports jackets or any other alternative item should not be worn to replace the blazer and jumper. If there is a change of weather, or if a pupil feels cold, their blazer and jumper must be worn initially with any alternative item on top of these.

Shirts must remain tucked in at all times and ties of a normal length (minimum of 6 stripes showing).

Can I also remind pupils and parents that pupils are only allowed to wear the Academy branded skirts.

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

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

This Week: SAFETY ON THE ROAD

As the weather is improving, we are starting to see an increased number of children walking or cycling to school and traffic related incidents become a major risk.

Staying safe on our roads isn't just a skill – it's a lifelong habit. It is crucial to learn key strategies for helping children navigate streets safely and confidently, from practicing journeys to teaching them how to choose the safest crossing points. The attached guidance offers real-world advice on issues like the dangers of parked vehicles, reversing cars and mobile phone distractions – it's an invaluable tool for parents and educators who want to help young people travel independently without compromising their safety. 10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators .

Traffic-related incidents are a significant risk for young pedestrians and cyclists, so understanding road safety is crucial for children's wellbeing. While all road users share responsibility for keeping one another safe, this guide offers strategies for empowering young people to navigate the roads confidently and responsibly.

TAKE PRACTICE JOURNEYS 1

Making "practice" journays with children is a great way to help them stay sale, thereby modeling responsible behaviours and heaving read sately conversations as they prepare to travel independently. Aid heaving prevention activities like spectrag electric vehicles – which may heav a grean mayber plate – and points of heaving at they are. Children is an by watching others, remind them that their passe might net always be the best role models.

BE BRIGHT, 2 **BE SEEN**

Weibility is lower during darker winter days, and drivers read to take extra care to leak out for pedestriens. Wearing bright and reflective clothing can help make children more visible to drivers near reads. In poor daylight conditions, encourage children to wear light, bright or fluorescent clothing. When it's dark, wear reflective clothing or materials such as a reflective armband or jackst.

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3 EYES UP

Encourage children to look up and loop their eyes on the read. Teach them to constantly watch for traffic and practice double-checking ding the read before crossing - looking right, left and then right again.

LIMIT h DISTRACTIONS

Where possible, devices like phones should be impt away from children while out and shoul near roads. If they're carrying devices, these should be put away until they're reached their destination. Children must also avaid playing with toys or being allotracied by friends. It a trian dwarts to show them correcting furny on their phone, there'll be time for that area they'r astice areas their phone, there'll b eafely arrived.

5 SLOW DOWN

Discuss the importance of waiting instead of crossing immediately. It can be tricky to judge the speed of traffic and spot obstacles that could cause a trip or a full. For eately, children must stop and think before they get to the barb and should always wait - not run - when areasing the read. They should avoid areasing until they're certain they have plenty of time. Down if traffic seems a long way off, it could still be approaching very quickly.

STOP BEFORE 6 THE KERB

Teach shidten to step before reaching the keth — net right at the edge of it. Heiting before they get to the keth allows them to see if anything is coming, whereas getting too clean to traffic dampiesus. If there is no preventent, children should stand back from the road's edge but ensure they can still see approaching traffic.

CROSS SAFELY 7

Children should always find a safe spet to cross the read, prioritizing rebra crossings or pelloan seesings, toothridges and subserys. Find a place where they can see traffic corning from both-directions, avoid crossing near junctions, bends in the read, or electroics that block their view, instead moving to consenters that block their view, instead moving to consenters that block their see and be seen. Remind them to use their eyes and ears together when checking the read, as sometimes they can hear traffic before they can see it. Looking and listening while crossing heips them quickly spet traffic, including cyclists and metoconvictes driving between other vehicles.

PARKED 8 VEHICLES

Crossing between parked vehicles is very dangarous. Teach children is use actra caution if creasing in this way, and, ideally, avoid it altogether. They should use the subide edge of a vehicle as if it were the keets, waiting and sheeking for traffic before meeting. They should ensure vehicles aren't about to meve, by looking for drivers in the vehicles and listening for engines running — but essentiate that electric vehicles are there is a gap between any partied vehicles on the other side, so they can reach the parameter.



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Children must never cross behind a revening vehicle – It's extremely dangerous. Remind them to leak for white revening lights and listen ext for woming sounds. Can they hear the engine sound or a radio playing inside the vehicle?

WAIT FOR THE 10 BUS TO LEAVE

When getting off a bus, children must wait for it. to leave before crossing so they can have a clear view of the read in both directions. This also allows them to see and be seen by other read users. Crossing near large which is in particularly dangerous and should be avoided.


We are delighted to announce that we will be relaunching the support programme for young carers within Weston Favell Academy.
